Not all class suggestions will get onto the schedules, but we can't evaluate ideas until you send them to us.

Learn

There is always room to improve. Try new things. Find and fill the gaps in your knowledge. Read something in a new genre or area of study.

Write

Find your pace. Schedule your time. If you're not ready to finish a novel, finish something smaller like a short story or newspaper article. Just finish a project, whatever it is, to show yourself and others that you can do it.

Celebrate

Did you succeed at something? Even things as small as "I wrote today" are worth celebrating. On the flip side, cheer the accomplishments of others. This is not a zero-sum-game. One person's success does not diminish another's. Enthusiasm is contagious.

Excel

I hope to see the League produce Utah's next mustread blockbuster authors. It could be you, or maybe that person you sit next to at chapter meetings. Even if your goals are smaller in scale, excel at what you do. Professionalism and expertise have huge rewards.

Give Back

Utah's writing community is different. We are more helpful, give advice more freely, and use the concept of synergy regularly. I've had a wonderful time learning from experts both inside and beyond the League. My challenge to you is to use what you've learned and pass it along. When you're ready, take that next step to mentor others. Brainstorm with others. Help with critiques. Give presentations. Share what you have and become a strong member of our growing community.
