Joyce Skidmore, keynote speaker Your Words Can Shake the World: Your Impact as a Writer

From her vast experience, Joyce has found the widespread power of the printed word. She will point out the responsibility of the writer and the impact of his/her work. Skidmore has served as editor of The Saga Weekly *Post* in Stavanger and Bergen, Norway, where she also conducted workshops for new playwrights. She has written weekly columns for The Rifle Telegram in Colorado and The Irvine World in



California. She has taught scriptwriting at the University of Utah, Westminster College and Pepperdine University, and is now instructor of communications and theatre at BYU Salt Lake Center. She also has her own public relations firm. Her biography is Who's Who in the West and in the National Register of Profiles.

A cover sheet must be included with author's name, address, phone number, and category. Manuscripts and critique forms will be returned only with an enclosed SASE.

Fee A \$10 entry fee, payable to Wasatch Mountain Fiction Writers, is required with each submission. Authors may submit multiple entries, each with a separate \$10 entry fee.
