2009 LUW Writing Contest

Theme: **Ancient Mysteries: Esoterica** in Fiction and Non-Fiction

With this year's contest over and the winners basking in the well-earned glow of success, the 2009 Contest Committee brings a fresh perspective to our next competition opening January 15th.

There are 25 categories, several new from last year and, since one generic form does not work for all categories, there are 4 new evaluation forms: (1) Poetry (2) Short Prose (3) Fiction Book (4) Non-Fiction Book.

Additionally, because good writing cannot be reduced to numbers, the judges will use a fine-tuned system to indicate the approximate degree of success on each criterion being evaluated. For clarity, judges will mark their comments directly on the entries where they apply.

Another important change has to do with full-length book manuscripts. Publishers commonly ask for only the first three chapters and a synopsis. If that much doesn't capture their interest, they won't ask to see the remainder.

This year, your full-length book entries will be comprised of only those critical first three chapters (and foreword if appropriate) + synopsis + table of contents. Each submission will be critiqued (not edited) and its likelihood of catching a publisher's attention evaluated.

Every effort is being made to select judges from around the country and the state in order to bring new and different eyes and expertise to the judging

process for this competition.

Finally, a Lucky 13 prize and a Roundup Theme Grand Prize will be awarded this year. See Rules and Categories for particulars.

Your Contest Committee is dedicated to presenting a great contest in 2009 with intriguing categories and awards. If you have ever aspired to test the boundaries of your talents, this is the year for reaching higher and wider.

Never written a short story, a poem or an article? Never tried a character sketch or a personal essay? This is the year to submit something new along with your old favorite categories. Every time creative people dare to stretch their imaginations, they discover exciting new dimensions of their talents.

The costs have been kept low to make it easy to submit multiple entries. The critiques alone are well worth the nominal fees. Don't agree with the critiques you've received in the past? It's still valuable to see how other experienced writers view your work.

Good writers know their craft, first and foremost. Use every tool at your disposal to ensure grammar, spelling and punctuation are near-perfect. We all make occasional errors but, contrary to the idea that "it's the Editor's job to edit," a great topic with a fascinating treatment will fail in contests and with publishers if the mechanics are sloppy or inaccurate.

It's critically important to read and follow all of the rules and category descriptions. Then submit your best polished work.

Be bold. Be creative. Try writing something completely out of your comfort zone. Make this your year to walk away with more awards than ever before. Get those computers humming, and best of luck to each of you.

- 1. Submit only your own original unpublished (as of the submission date) works that have never won an LUW cash prize.
- 2. Enter each manuscript in one category only. All entries are final as submitted. No early entries accepted.

- **3.** LUW may combine any categories with fewer than ten (10) entries, or declare no contest. Entries may be assigned to a more appropriate category.
- **4.** Manuscripts will receive a critique only, not an edit.
- 5. Entries in violation of the rules or in poor taste will be disqualified and entry fees and critiques will be forfeited.
- 6. Entries returned through Chapter Presidents at Roundup in September, or submit an envelope and enough postage with the entry for return by mail.
- 7. Author's name will not appear on the manuscript, synopsis or the excerpt.
- 8. USE CORRECT MANUSCRIPT FORM THROUGHOUT including double-spacing with black 12-point type. Use easy to read fonts such as Times New Roman or Garamond on standard white paper. No fancy type, colored paper, binders or pictures. Poetry may be single-spaced.
- 9. In categories that require a synopsis, use appropriate heading, title it *Synopsis* and submit a **1-page**, single-spaced plot summary written in <u>present tense</u> with ending included.
- **10. ALL PROSE ENTRIES** require a **1-page, double-spaced excerpt** for 1st place winner to read aloud at Roundup.

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

In my writing career over the past 36 years, I have written hundreds of poems. I have written several dozen songs. I have written dozens of nonfiction real-life experiences. I have tried my hand only once or twice at writing fiction. But never yet have I tried writing fantasy or a fairytale even though I have thought a lot about it and have wanted to try.

I would like to write a Fairytale, you know, the kind of fairytale like *Cinderella*, *Snow White*, *Sleeping Beauty*, or even something as simple as the *Shoemaker's Elves* or *Jack and the Beanstalk*. It doesn't seem all that hard. Theselittle stories appear to be so simple. It seems like all I would have to do is take an idea and drive it along an interesting road, through a

few intersections, make a left turn occasionally and then maybe even make a couple right turns until finally coming to the final destination where the main character (the driver) lives happily ever after.

I know there would have to be a flat tire or a dead battery along the way (like *Cinderella's* ripped dress, or *Snow White's* bite of a poison apple), but the mechanic always comes to the rescue to repair the problem and make continuation of the trip possible.

There are so many destination possibilities. The roads are endless and unlimited. It's just a matter of getting behind the wheel and turning the key—but make sure, and this must be my problem—don't run out of gas. As for me. I never seem to make it to the gas station in the first place.

Writers need fuel to keep the story going just like a car does. Just make sure you use the proper fuel for the kind of story you are writing, so your trip (story) won't be sluggish and full of jerky, frustrating movements.



LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS ABOUT FAMOUS WRITERS

- Jack London. In his lifetime, Jack London was not only a hobo, but also a seaman, before educating himself and gaining admission to the University of California at Berkley. London, a noted Socialist, also once ran for mayor of Oakland California in 1901 under the Social Party ticket. He wrote `Call Of The Wild', amongst other stories.
- Robert Frost. Robert Frost, poet, was the favored writer of President John F. Kennedy.
 He participated in his 1961 inauguration by reciting two of his poems. By the time Robert

Frost died in 1963, he was the unofficial poet laureate of the USA. He won the Pulitzer Prize four times.

 Louisa May Alcott. Born in Germantown, Pennsylvania in 1832, Louisa May Alcott was a suffragette. While living in Concord, New Hampshire in 1879, she registered to vote and did vote in the Concord school election, and thus became the first woman to vote in Concorde. She is famous for writing, 'Little Women'.
